

The Rights of Children of Incarcerated Parents: Replicating good practice from Italy

The *Permanent Mission of Italy, the Permanent Mission of Argentina* and the *Child Rights Connect Working Group on Children of Incarcerated Parents* invite you to an implementation briefing on the rights of children of incarcerated parents as outlined in Human Rights Council Resolution 19/37 on the Rights of the Child and by the Committee on the Rights of the Child in their concluding observations.

Around the world children are separated from their parents by incarceration. How can these children's rights, including non-separation and the right to a relationship with their family (where in their best interests) be upheld? In an innovative partnership Italian NGO Bambinisenzasbarre signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Justice and the National Ombudswoman for Childhood and Adolescence, aimed at the fulfilment of the rights of children of incarcerated parents throughout the country. Steps are being taken to replicate this good practice in other countries. This event will highlight how this Memorandum and the partnership behind it work in practice, how this is being replicated in Argentina and lessons for replication in other States seeking to protect the rights of these children.
